



## What Makes a **Trained** Leader?

Adult leaders in units are considered trained and eligible to wear the official *Trained* emblem once they have completed *Youth Protection Training* (YPT) and the training courses outlined below.

**Youth Protection Training is a requirement for all registered adults and must be retaken every two years.** To take YPT, go to the BSA *E-Learning Management System* at [www.my.scouting.org](http://www.my.scouting.org). After you log in, click on "My Dashboard" under the menu button. If you don't remember your username or password, contact the [BSA National Help Desk](http://www.bsa.org) at (972) 280-2489.

**Leader Specific Training Courses Now Available Online!** - You may complete many leader specific training courses from your home or office computer through the BSA *E-Learning Management System*. To access this system, simply log in to your [www.my.scouting.org](http://www.my.scouting.org) account as discussed above. Click on the "Training Center" button of the navigation bar to display the list of courses you may click on and view. When you have completed a course, be sure to print off or download the certificate and then present it to your unit leader, district training committee member, or district executive to assure that it is properly recorded. Training is a vital component of the unit, district, and council *Journey to Excellence* (JTE) program. Training is also a critical component in the delivery of high quality program to the youth we serve.

If you need your BSA Membership ID #, call the Morris-1<sup>st</sup> Source Scout Center at (574) 289-0337. To link your BSA Membership ID # to your *Youth Protection Training*: Sign into your [www.my.scouting.org](http://www.my.scouting.org) account first. Click on "Menu," next click on "Legacy Web Tools," and then click on "Manage Member ID." Finally, complete the information on the screen.

Common sense tells us that training is important. Research shows the importance of trained leaders. A trained leader is knowledgeable and more confident in the role being performed. Trained leaders exhibit a knowledge and confidence that is picked up by people around them. Trained leaders impact the quality of programs, leader tenure, youth tenure, safety, and a whole lot more.
