- Blanket, clipboard, watch, compass
- Plastic trash bag, flashlight
- Eight (8) foot lengths of rope (whipped)
- Paper and pencil
- Patrol flag
- Patrol roster
- One can of soup per scout (no cream of Soups)
- Two (2) six foot long staves
- Roll of Twine, tin foil, cookies
- Water bottle for each Patrol member
- Scout handbook
- Cup for each Scout
- Fire building materials to build your own strong fire.
- two tarps for shelters.
- Tin Can, Two (2) foot long 2x4 lumber

The Klondike Gold Rush was a migration by an estimated 100,000 prospectors to the Klondike region of the Yukon, in north-western Canada, between 1896 and 1899. Gold was discovered there by local miners on August 16, 1896, and, when news reached Seattle and San Francisco the following year, it triggered a stampede of prospectors. Some became wealthy, but the majority went in vain.

CLOTHING

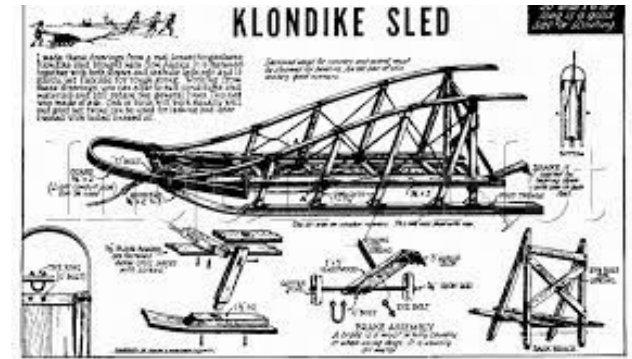
One of the most important parts of a Klondike Derby is to keep warm and dry. Each Scout must know what to wear. Winter weather is very unpredictable, requiring preparedness for almost any condition. A nice day can turn into a raging blizzard. Your best protection is your common sense. Dress in layers. Avoid working up a sweat, and keep yourself comfortable by removing or adding layers of clothing. No cotton clothing! Waterproof boots are essential. A wool stocking cap or similar head gear is necessary both during the day and at night. sleeping bag to retain warmth. Gloves may be worn, but they are not as warm as mittens.

TEAM SPIRIT

Have patrol yells perfected, and your flags impressive. All competition will be based off team involvement. GO STAMPEDERS !

KLONDIKE SLED

Anything goes. Design as you wish as long as it does not have wheels and is dragged by your patrol members. (there will be points for authentic type sleds.)



LEADER participation

Leaders have the opportunity this year to also build a sled and compete side by side with the Scouts.

Leaders must have teams of three or more. Leader teams must be prepared upon arrival with the same gear list as the patrols or crews.

WEBELOS

Webelos Scouts are encouraged to attend. There will be a category for the Webelos scouts too. Using the same equipment list and also building a sled, you too will be able to run with the older prospectors to find the gold.
